REQUIRED BOOKS TO READ AND COMPLETE ASSIGNMENTS FOR SUMMER READING:

For Dual Enrollment English III, you will be required to complete TWO summer reading assignments that will count as the first grades of your spring semester Honors English III class with Mrs. Studer. You will hand in these assignments on the first day of school in August, taking them to Mrs. Studer in her classroom. Mrs. Studer will keep them until you start her class in the spring. If you don't have them ready to turn in on the first day of school, late points will be deducted when they are graded for the spring term!

You will be required to read TWO books.

1. First, you must purchase a copy of and read Arthur Miller's play, *The Crucible*. While reading the play, you must use sticky notes to annotate it for significant passages pertaining to characterization, conflict, and theme. There is no specific requirement regarding the number of sticky notes you do--just be prepared to take an open-book literary analysis quiz on the first day of the spring semester. You will hand in your annotated novel on the first day of school in August. Be sure to have a sticky note with your name on it on the cover.

2. For your second book, you must complete the assignment as directed below.

This summer you must choose one full-length work of <u>NONFICTION</u> to read. <u>Your book of choice must</u> <u>focus on the life of a notable American OR on a significant event in American history</u>.

After reading the book, you must complete the writing responses listed below. The entire list of responses should be TYPED on one continuous document that you will PRINT OUT and hand in on the first day of school, along with your annotated copy of *The Crucible*. <u>Please type the full text of each question</u>, followed by your response, written in complete sentences.

1. Type a one-paragraph summary of the book. Be sure to include the book's title and author in this!

2. What is the most important thing the author wanted you to learn or think about after reading the book? Explain.

- 3. Describe the most interesting thing YOU learned from the book.
- 4. Describe how you can use what you learned from this book in your own life.
- 5. Describe any stylistic text features the author used and how they affected your reading experience.

6. Describe anything or anyone you would like to know more about after reading the book. What about this person/event intrigued you? What more would you like to know?

7. A situation in the book reminds me of something that happened to me or someone else because...

8. The ideas or events in this book remind me of ideas or events in (another book, movies, news) because. . .

9. Describe what you would change about the book (or a particular part of the book) and why.

10. The passage on page(s)______ is an example of good writing because.... (be sure to type the text of the passage before explaining your answer).

11. Describe new insights or understandings you have after reading the book.

12. Write out the text of an email you could send to the author of the book with your questions and responses to his/her writing.
